Youth employment programs

1. Bladerunners Employment Program (John Howard Society of Victoria)

Description: BladeRunners is free training for those who are 17 – 30 years old and who are in need of support and mentorship. The goal of the program is to assist individuals obtain employment in customer service or construction industries. Training includes First aid and CPR, WHMIS, Food Safe, fall protection, boom lift and skid steer safety training, customer service and kitchen training. The Job Search Program is made up of highly experienced, professionally trained staff who are ready and willing to help youth with their job search and job maintenance. They have been successfully helping people into employment since 1979. The John Howard Society is a self-governing non-profit community based organization.

Participant Eligibility:

- Must be between 17 & 30
- Must be in need of employment support and/or mentorship

2. Framework Job Search Program (WorkLink)

Description: 4 week program of facilitated group work from Mon-Fri, 9:30-2:30, at the WorkLink offices in Langford (101-847 Goldstream Avenue). Program shares information and job search tools, and also provides the opportunity to meet local employers. Short-term certificate training, wage subsidy for training on the job, transportation assistance and other financial supports provided. May or may not continue indefinitely; next start dates are May 15th and July 10th, 2017.

Referral Process: Call WorkBC

Participant Eligibility: Must be 19+ and non EI-eligible.



3. Springboard to Success (Beacon Community Services)

Description: The Springboard to Success program is a paid employment program for people aged 15-30 years old. This 17-week course includes workshops, certificates, active job search/volunteer component, and a wage subsidized placement. Participants are assisted with obtaining employment in an area of their choosing with ongoing support.

Participant Eligibility:

- Must be between 15-30 years old
- Must be unemployed and not in school
- Must be looking for long term employment
- Must not be eligible for El
- Must be at-risk (1+ of following: single parent, aboriginal youth, youth with a disability, visible minority, living in a rural/remote area, health or drug/alcohol related problems, low literacy, street involvement, risk of homelessness, high school non-completion or GED.

4. START Youth Employment Program (WorkLink)

Description: a job search program for youth between the ages of 15 & 30 years old who are not in school and are looking for work. Offers some wage coverage to employers during first 3 months of employment.

5. The CREW (Quadra Village Community Centre)

Description: an employment readiness and life skills program for youth ages 13-19 looking for employment and/or to gain skills for employment such as resume & cover letter building, looking for work, and interview skills. The CREW helps youth build leadership, employment & fundraising skills through hands-on work experience, interactive youth driven workshops and one to one support. Offered are 1:1 resume and job preparation supports, as well as programming every Monday between 4-6pm. The CREW is open to anyone who is willing to participate and be engaged with the programming. There is only 1 facilitator of this program, so if an individual requires a high level of support, they are encouraged to bring a care aid along to ensure that everyone's needs are met.

Description:

Prepares students for the work environment through learning skills for point of sale transactions and a solid base of knowledge in Customer Service.

Adult Employment Programs – CLBC eligible individuals

The following organizations support individuals eligible for funding through CLBC. You can meet CLBC Eligibility Requirements if you are 19 years of age and older and fit one of the following:

- Developmental Disability: significantly impaired intellectual functioning and significantly impaired adaptive functioning, where these limitations must have started before age 18.
- Personalized Supports Initiative: significant limitation in adaptive functioning, and either a diagnosis of Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorder (FASD) or a diagnosis of a Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD is officially referred to as Pervasive Developmental Disorder).

1. Supported Employment Program – Community Living Victoria (CLV)

Description: The Supported Employment Program supports people with developmental disabilities to sustain rewarding and satisfying jobs with employers who want committed employees. Along with the additional income, a rewarding job tends to reduce loneliness and increase social networks, community awareness, confidence and self-esteem.

Referral Process: For youth who are already accessing MCFD supports, your first step is to contact your MCFD worker for assistance with the transition. For adults, the first step is for you or your family member to contact a CLBC facilitator.

Participant Eligibility: Must be 19 years of age or older, but may apply for CLBC eligibility after their 16th birthday. Must be eligible for CLBC funded services.



2. Garth Homer Society Employment Services

Description: Garth Homer Employment Services matches adults with developmental disabilities with the right position and provides job coaching and on-going support to ensure the fit works.

You must be an adult, 19 years or older, and eligible to receive services through Community Living British Columbia (CLBC). If you are not already registered with CLBC, please call them at 250-952-4203 and ask to speak to a duty worker to set up an assessment or an intake.

Participant Eligibility:

- Demonstrate safety in the community
- Use of public transportation (HandyDart or city bus)
- Independence in personal care
- Appropriate behaviour in the community

3. Pheonix Human Services Employment Support

Description: In all of Pheonix's Community Inclusion Programs, the goal is to enhance the lives of adults who are living with a developmental disability by supporting them to have full inclusion in their community. Employment is one way for people to improve their lives, learn new skills, and participate more fully in their communities. Employment also creates meaningful relationships and increases financial independence.

Referral Process: Through Community Living British Columbia (CLBC).

Participant Eligibility: You must be an adult, 19 years or older, and eligible to receive services through Community Living British Columbia (CLBC). If you are not already registered with CLBC, please call them at 250-952-4203 and ask to speak to a duty worker to set up an assessment or an intake.



4. Supported Employment, Kardel Consulting Inc.

Description: The Supported Employment Project has been supporting people with disabilities in jobs since 1998. They offer initial employment assessments, job search and matching, on-the-job training, coaching etc.

Referral Process: Employment services are available to all adults with development disabilities who are interested in finding employment. Participants must also be eligible for CLBC funding and be referred by a CLBC facilitator.

5. Roads Program (Community Inclusion Consulting Inc.)

Description: The ROADS program, run through Community Inclusion Consulting Inc.,

finds tasks suited to each person's abilities and interests. They receive on-the-job training with a provided job coach up to three months or until all parties are satisfied the person can handle the job independently. There is a contact person who provides on-going follow- up to ensure problems are addressed promptly. The program is being redesigned to transition youth from high school to paid employment.

6. Lifetime Networks

Description: Lifetime Networks' "Being a Citizen" program offers a post-secondary program that allows individuals to explore current events, learn about computer basics, wellness, nutrition, socializing, pre-employment skills and resume building. Participants have the option of attending from one to five days per week. Lifetime Networks can also provide minimal supports to a youth who has current employment.

7. InclusionWorks!

Description: InclusionWorks! provides an individualized, age appropriate, community- based program for young adults with developmental disabilities. InclusionWorks! is a model of community inclusion and collaboration developed by and for families of young adults with developmental disabilities who are eligible for CLBC support. Relying less on "traditional" service provision, InclusionWorks! families have opted for Individualized Funding from CLBC and we promote effective community inclusion through a family gover- nance model. InclusionWorks! offers the support of an Employment Facilitator for participants in their program.

Adult employment programs – Non-CLBC funded

The following programs have various eligibility criteria, for non-CLBC eligible individuals.

1. WorkBC

Description: WorkBC is the provincial government's access point to the world of work in British Columbia. WorkBC helps people find jobs, explore career options and improve their skills. WorkBC has several offices throughout Greater Victoria. The GT Hiring Gorge Road East location for Work BC specializes in disability employment services but is not restricted to disability only. If your son or daughter is in their last year of high school or recently graduated, all locations offer job search tools and the option for a case manager. Work BC will be able refer your son or daughter to the to the appropriate service provider.

2. Networks Employment Solutions (Capital Mental Health Association)

Description: Networks offers a range of supported employment solutions. Networks supports the entire employment process from creating a résumé and cover letter, to job searching, and to employment coaching. This service is for people with barriers to employment who have a mental illness or addiction.

- Must be connected to the health care system; Receiving support from a doctor, casemanager, psychiatrist or other health care professional AND that you are willing to work with your health care professional to follow a treatment plan for your mental illness or addiction

3. REES Program (Resources, Education, Employment, Support)

Description: Cool Aid uses a co-operative, recovery-based approach to help reduce the isolation from community, friends and family that is often a result of mental illness and addictions. We work in partnership with families and professionals to enhance the lives of people with mental illnesses or addictions.

The 24-week program will assist participants to gain the skills and support which will help them achieve long-term, sustainable employment in an entrepreneurial endeavor.

Participant Eligibility:

- Must self- identify as having a permanent physical or mental disability
- Be under employed (less than 20 hours per week) or unemployed
- Not collecting unemployment insurance (EI)
- Have not had an El claim in the last 3 years
- Legally entitled to work in Canada
- Require assistance to prepare for self-employment
- Demonstrate job readiness
- Have a sound business idea
- Is aware of, and committed to, meeting all milestones (conducting market research, completing a self-employment business plan, etc.)



Post-Secondary Programs

1. Steps Forward

Description: STEPS Forward is a family-driven organization founded to ensure that people with disabilities are included as students in the academic and social life of colleges and universities of British Columbia. Inclusive post-secondary education is provided by STEPS Forward by working with individuals, families and systems before and after the university or college experience.

Each student must request CLBC funding to cover the STEPS Forward facilitators. This funding can be redirected from other CLBC funded services (e.g. day program funding can be STEPS Forward funding)

Eligibility/selection is NOT based on:

- Level or complexity of the disability
- Reading level, math level or any other skill



2. Camosun College – Employment Training and Preparation (ETP)

Description: The ETP Program is part of the ETP (Employment Training and Preparation) Department at Camosun College. The ETP Department involves 4 different certificate programs, including EARTH gardening, Food and Customer Service, Customer Service, and Workplace Literacy and Numeracy. The ETP program takes place at Camosun College's Interurban campus.

- Able to get themselves to campus and work sites independently

3. Camosun College – Disability Resource Centre

Description: The Disability Resource Centre (DRC) provides a wide range of services and educational accommodations for students with a documented disability, including anxiety and depression. DRC faculty and staff are available on both campuses to arrange services and supports such as classroom and exam accommodations, accessibility assistance, and to act as a resource for students, faculty and staff.

Eligibility:

If you have documented needs that require accommodation in the classroom, the DRC offers services to help. This includes support for the following conditions:

- Learning disabilities
- Mental health disabilities, such as
 - anxiety
 - depression
 - bipolar
 - schizophrenia
- Neurological disabilities, including
 - head injury
 - ADD/ADHD
 - CP
- Chronic health and physical disabilities
- Visual disabilities
- Deaf or hard of hearing

4. University of Victoria – Resource Centre for Students with a Disability

Description: The RCSD is a division of <u>Student Services</u> at the University of Victoria. In partnership with faculty, staff, and students, they promote educational equity for students with disabilities and support those students in achieving their academic goals. They provide services and coordinate academic accommodations to students. They also act as a resource to faculty and work with the University community to help create a more accessible learning environment.

Participant Eligibility: The following professionals can diagnose and provide medical documentation as recognized by the Ministry of Advanced Education and the University of Victoria by a:

- Physical disability: a physician
- Visual impairment: an ophthalmologist, optometrist or orthoptist
- Hard of hearing or deaf: a certified audiologist
- Neurological disability: a neurologist, neuropsychologist, psychiatrist or physician
- Psychiatric disability: a clinical psychologist, psychiatrist or physician
- Developmental disability: a physician or psychologist
- Learning disability: a registered clinical psychologist or certified school psychologist



5. Job Options BC (Victoria)

Description: A Labour Market Agreement program that assists unemployed people 18 years of age or older with long term job search help, supported work experience and follow-up support services. Job Options BC in Victoria is run through Sprott-Shaw Community College. Tuition is fully covered with a training allowance of \$8.00 per hour for 25 hours for the first six weeks in class.

6. Multi-Industry Skills Training (MIST)

Description: The purpose of the Multi-Industry Skills Training (MIST) program is to provide certification training for entry-level positions to participants who are job ready. The focus of the training will be for employment in multiple sectors, including: oil and gas, marine, road-building, and construction sectors. MIST graduates will have the skills and certification to effectively contribute to a diverse and productive workplace.

Description: Classes are hands-on in a computer lab with 15 students per class. Each student gets their own computer. There are introductory and intermediate courses that run for 4 weeks at a time and are held from 9:00am-11:45am Monday –Friday.

- Microsoft Word (advanced applications)

12. Distance Computer Comfort - Neil Squire Society

Description: Participants are matched with a volunteer or staff member to work once a week on your self-determined goals (could be Word processing, Windows, Email, Internet, Social Networking, etc.). Participants are provided with free online computer skills tutoring using self-paced, client centered learning.

- There is the option to participate from your own home or a community site. If you choose to participate from home, distance learning is available anywhere in Canada through the internet. This allows for a flexible learning schedule, and allows tutors to connect, speak and share in real time.

- An Assistive Technology Specialist is available to consult on the most appropriate hardware and software to overcome any physical barriers you may have. In addition, they can provide specialized equipment on short-term loans (eg. Alternative keyboards and mice, screen magnification software, voice recognition software).

13. Beacon Community Services

Description: Cashier and Customer Service training courses are in partnership with the United Way. Both courses are usually held at the Pandora Avenue Thrift Shop a few times a year.

Referral Process: Call Trish at 250-388-3500

Participant Eligibility: Availability to attend all classes and arrive on time.

- *Cashier Training:* Free, 3 week long course. Participants will learn how to operate a cash register and point-of-sale machine, as well as strengthen their customer service skills and workplace safety habits.
- *Retail Training:* Free, 8 week long course. Participants will get hands-on experience working in a busy store environment. Each individual will learn how to price, sort and display merchandise, how to serve customers and run the cash machines, and more.
